"I'm a son"


"I'm a social worker"





Goodwin puts CARE office into Charleston budget

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Charleston City Council approved the budget for 2019-20 fiscal year with an amendment to add Mayor Amy Shuler Goodwin's Coordinated Addiction Response Effort office.


The budget and amendment passed with only one nay heard from Councilwoman Shannon Snodgrass, a Democrat representing Ward 11. Snodgrass said the only reason she did not vote for the budget was because of the amendment.

Goodwin allocated \$100,000 for the next fiscal year and about \$60,000 for the remainder of the current fiscal year for the CARE program.
