Organ Transplant



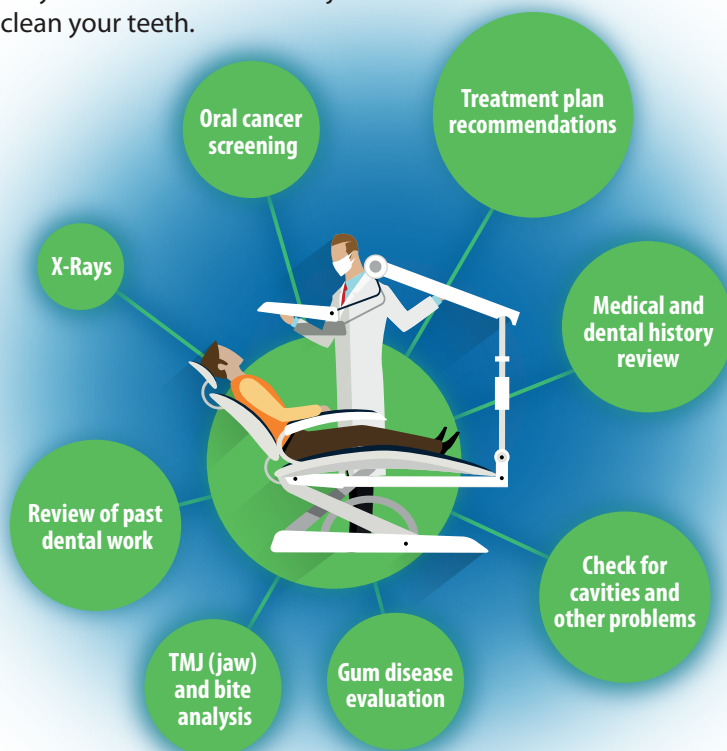
